3. LAND OWNERSHIP: LAND WAS A SYMBOL OF WEALTH AND POWER, PROMPTING EUROPEANS TO SEEK NEW TERRITORIES FOR AGRICULTURAL EXPANSION.

1.2 RELIGIOUS FACTORS

1. RELIGIOUS FREEDOM: VARIOUS RELIGIOUS GROUPS, INCLUDING PURITANS AND QUAKERS, SOUGHT REFUGE FROM PERSECUTION IN EUROPE.
2. MISSIONARY EFFORTS: THERE WAS A STRONG DESIRE TO SPREAD CHRISTIANITY AMONG NATIVE AMERICANS, WHICH WAS A SIGNIFICANT ASPECT OF THE COLONIAL AGENDA.

2. ESTABLISHMENT OF THE THIRTEEN COLONIES

THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE THIRTEEN COLONIES UNFOLDED GRADUALLY OVER THE FIRST HALF OF THE 17TH CENTURY. EACH COLONY HAD ITS OWN UNIQUE CHARACTERISTICS, SHAPED BY THE MOTIVATIONS AND BACKGROUNDS OF ITS FOUNDERS.

2.1 THE SOUTHERN COLONIES

THE SOUTHERN COLONIES, INCLUDING VIRGINIA, MARYLAND, NORTH CAROLINA, SOUTH CAROLINA, AND GEORGIA, WERE PRIMARILY ESTABLISHED FOR ECONOMIC REASONS.

- VIRGINIA (1607): THE FIRST PERMANENT ENGLISH COLONY IN AMERICA, FOUNDED BY THE VIRGINIA COMPANY. IT BECAME KNOWN FOR ITS TOBACCO PLANTATIONS.
- MARYLAND (1632): ESTABLISHED AS A HAVEN FOR CATHOLICS, MARYLAND'S ECONOMY ALSO RELIED HEAVILY ON TOBACCO.
- NORTH AND SOUTH CAROLINA (1663): INITIALLY A SINGLE COLONY, IT SPLIT DUE TO GEOGRAPHICAL AND ECONOMIC DIFFERENCES, WITH SOUTH CAROLINA FOCUSING ON RICE AND INDIGO CULTIVATION.
- GEORGIA (1732): FOUNDED AS A BUFFER AGAINST SPANISH FLORIDA AND AS A PLACE FOR DEBTORS AND THE POOR.

2.2 THE MIDDLE COLONIES

THE MIDDLE COLONIES, CONSISTING OF NEW YORK, PENNSYLVANIA, NEW JERSEY, AND DELAWARE, WERE KNOWN FOR THEIR DIVERSITY AND RELIGIOUS TOLERANCE.

- NEW YORK (1664): ORIGINALLY A DUTCH COLONY CALLED NEW AMSTERDAM, IT WAS TAKEN OVER BY THE ENGLISH AND BECAME A MELTING POT OF CULTURES.
- PENNSYLVANIA (1681): FOUNDED BY WILLIAM PENN AS A QUAKER HAVEN, IT PROMOTED RELIGIOUS FREEDOM AND HARMONIOUS RELATIONS WITH NATIVE AMERICANS.
- NEW JERSEY (1664): ESTABLISHED FOR AGRICULTURAL PROSPERITY AND LATER BECAME KNOWN FOR ITS DIVERSE POPULATION AND RELIGIOUS TOLERANCE.
- DELAWARE (1638): INITIALLY SETTLED BY SWEDISH COLONISTS, IT WAS LATER TAKEN BY THE DUTCH AND THEN THE ENGLISH, EMPHASIZING ITS STRATEGIC LOCATION.

2.3 THE NEW ENGLAND COLONIES

THE NEW ENGLAND COLONIES WERE CHARACTERIZED BY THEIR PURITAN ROOTS AND A FOCUS ON COMMUNITY AND RELIGION.

- MASSACHUSETTS (1620): FOUNDED BY THE PILGRIMS AT PLYMOUTH AND LATER EXPANDED BY THE PURITANS, IT BECAME A CENTER FOR RELIGIOUS REFORM.
- CONNECTICUT (1636): ESTABLISHED BY DISSENTERS FROM MASSACHUSETTS, IT EMPHASIZED A MORE DEMOCRATIC GOVERNMENT WITH THE FUNDAMENTAL ORDERS.
- RHODE ISLAND (1636): FOUNDED BY DISSENTERS SEEKING RELIGIOUS FREEDOM, IT BECAME KNOWN FOR ITS PROGRESSIVE STANCE ON CHURCH-STATE SEPARATION.
- NEW HAMPSHIRE (1623): INITIALLY PART OF MASSACHUSETTS, IT BECAME A SEPARATE COLONY FOCUSING ON FISHING AND TRADE.

3. INTERACTIONS WITH NATIVE AMERICANS

THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN EUROPEAN SETTLERS AND NATIVE AMERICAN TRIBES WAS COMPLEX AND OFTEN FRAUGHT WITH CONFLICT.

3.1 EARLY ENCOUNTERS

- INITIAL INTERACTIONS WERE OFTEN MARKED BY TRADE AND COOPERATION, WITH NATIVE AMERICANS PROVIDING ESSENTIAL KNOWLEDGE OF THE LAND AND RESOURCES.
- HOWEVER, MISUNDERSTANDINGS AND DIFFERING WORLDVIEWS FREQUENTLY LED TO TENSIONS.

3.2 CONFLICTS AND WARS

1. KING PHILIP'S WAR (1675-1676): A SIGNIFICANT CONFLICT IN NEW ENGLAND THAT AROSE FROM COLONIAL EXPANSION AND LAND DISPUTES, RESULTING IN DEVASTATING LOSSES FOR BOTH SIDES.
2. PEQUOT WAR (1636-1638): A CONFLICT BETWEEN ENGLISH SETTLERS AND THE PEQUOT TRIBE, LEADING TO THE NEAR DESTRUCTION OF THE PEQUOT NATION.

4. COLONIAL SOCIETY AND ECONOMY

THE THIRTEEN COLONIES DEVELOPED DISTINCT SOCIETIES AND ECONOMIES THAT REFLECTED THEIR REGIONAL CHARACTERISTICS.

4.1 SOCIAL STRUCTURES

- SOUTHERN COLONIES: CHARACTERIZED BY A PLANTATION ECONOMY, THE SOCIAL HIERARCHY WAS DEFINED BY LAND OWNERSHIP, WITH WEALTHY PLANTERS AT THE TOP AND ENSLAVED AFRICANS AT THE BOTTOM.
- MIDDLE COLONIES: KNOWN FOR THEIR DIVERSITY, THE SOCIAL STRUCTURE INCLUDED A MIX OF CULTURES, RELIGIONS, AND ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES.
- NEW ENGLAND COLONIES: COMMUNITIES WERE OFTEN TIGHT-KNIT AND CENTERED AROUND RELIGIOUS CONGREGATIONS, WITH AN EMPHASIS ON EDUCATION AND CIVIC DUTY.

4.2 ECONOMIC ACTIVITIES

1. AGRICULTURE: TOBACCO, RICE, AND INDIGO WERE KEY CASH CROPS IN THE SOUTH, WHILE THE NORTH RELIED ON SUBSISTENCE FARMING AND FISHING.
2. TRADE: THE MIDDLE COLONIES BECAME A HUB FOR TRADE DUE TO THEIR LOCATION AND ACCESS TO RIVERS, FACILITATING COMMERCE WITH EUROPE AND THE WEST INDIES.
3. CRAFTSMANSHIP AND INDUSTRY: NEW ENGLAND DEVELOPED A BURGEONING TRADE IN SHIPBUILDING, TEXTILES, AND OTHER CRAFTS, REFLECTING ITS RESOURCE-RICH ENVIRONMENT.

5. THE ROAD TO INDEPENDENCE

BY THE EARLY 18TH CENTURY, THE COLONIES BEGAN TO DEVELOP A SENSE OF IDENTITY DISTINCT FROM THEIR EUROPEAN ROOTS. THIS GROWING SENSE OF INDEPENDENCE SET THE STAGE FOR FUTURE CONFLICTS.

5.1 COLONIAL GOVERNANCE

- COLONIAL ASSEMBLIES BEGAN TO ASSERT MORE POWER, CHALLENGING THE AUTHORITY OF ROYAL GOVERNORS AND BRITISH PARLIAMENT.
- THE GREAT AWAKENING (1730s-1740s) FOSTERED A SPIRIT OF QUESTIONING AUTHORITY, LEADING TO A RISE IN RELIGIOUS FERVOR AND INDIVIDUALISM.

5.2 ECONOMIC INDEPENDENCE

- AS THE COLONIES PROSPERED, THEY SOUGHT GREATER CONTROL OVER THEIR TRADE AND ECONOMIC POLICIES, LEADING TO TENSIONS WITH BRITAIN.
- THE NAVIGATION ACTS, WHICH RESTRICTED COLONIAL TRADE TO ENGLAND, FUELED RESENTMENT AND A DESIRE FOR INDEPENDENCE.
